Hello and welcome to this the third Governor's Newsletter, I hope you find the contents informative.

Last year was, as always, a very active year for governors, dominated, of course, by the search for a new headteacher following the retirement of Mr Pearson.

Our intention was to have a new head in post by September of last year and hopes were high as the advert was placed on the County Council website. Sadly the response was not as high as we had hoped and we decided that it would be in the best interests of the school to wait a few weeks before we tried again.

Miss Prodger was asked if she would be willing to temporarily take on the role of head, assisted by Mrs Hewes as deputy. Both agreed to step up to the new roles and I'm sure you will agree that they have carried out the task both confidently and professionally.

The new advert was somewhat more successful and following shortlisting in December a two day selection process took place in late January. This resulted in the successful selection of Mr Peter Taylor, who is currently head of Larkfields Junior School in Nuthall. Peter's selection was ratified by the full board of governors and by the time you receive this newsletter he will be in place.

Whilst no governor has stepped down over the past year we have been joined by three new parent governors, Mrs Kirsten Rawson, Mrs Juliette Sunderland and Mr Simon Atkinson, all three have very quickly become active and valuable members. I have been a governor at BHPS for over 20 years and I truly believe that the current board is one of the strongest we have had during that period.

Finally I would also like to put on record our sincere thanks to the PTA who work tirelessly to raise funds for various projects around the school. We have always benefited from an active PTA at BHPS and the current team is no exception, the school is very lucky to have such a devoted group assisting it.

Governors at Parents Evening – by Cate Ross-Wadell

During Parents Evening week I was able to be on the main door, welcoming parents and checking if they knew where their child's teacher was based. I really enjoyed meeting parents and having a short chat to them as I showed them where to go. I introduced myself as a governor and had very positive feedback. Many parents said that they didn't know who the governors were and that it was good to put a face to a name. Some commented too that they appreciated the Governor newsletter.

We want to get to know parents and be available to chat about any aspect of school life.

It was a positive experience for me and this is something the governors will now do on Parent Evenings.

Funding for Schools

The Minister for Education is consulting on changes to the way the government currently provides funding for schools. The present system is made up of a number of factors, based mainly on an amount of money per pupil and various sums linked to individual pupil and school needs. This money is paid to the local authority who then pass (most) of this on to the school after taking out a percentage for administration etc. The amount passed on varies by area but currently Nottinghamshire is one of the better authorities.

By far the largest sum is the per pupil allocation which, surprisingly, is not a national figure but one historically based on location in the UK. This can mean that some local authorities, and hence schools, receive significantly less than others.

Nottinghamshire has always been in the lower allocation bracket and as a result our school receives less per pupil than an equivalent school in, for instance, Hertfordshire and significantly less than in many parts of London. This has been a thorn in the side of a number of local authorities for some years now and although an attempt was made some 3/4 years ago to address the problem, nothing really changed.

However, it would appear that the present government has finally recognised this inequality and has made some positive proposals (without specifics!) to address this thorny issue and is proposing to implement changes to local authority education funding from 2017/18. In addition, from 2019/20, the proposals are that funding will be paid direct to schools, so cutting out the local authority altogether; presumably this is intended to link in with the move toward academies due at the same time.

Governors would argue that any change to the present system can only be to the benefit of BHPS and Nottinghamshire in general, time will tell.

Governor Week - by Juliette Sunderland

Twice a year the school has Governor week when the Governors are invited into school to attend classes, run assemblies and to take an active part in the school. This term Governor Week was w/c 21st March. I was present at school during the week and attended the Lower Junior show which I can wholeheartedly say was excellent, despite there been a huge amount of children off sick. The children and teachers put a lot of effort into the show and it was enjoyed by many of the parents through 3 separate performances.

I undertook spelling tests in 1W and also helped with the reading in F2F as I am the Link Governor for Foundation. The children are great fun and always super behaved when you go in to visit. I have much respect for the teachers who managed incredibly well, despite the increase in class size and constant curriculum changes.

Other Governors attended Rainbow Grammar, took maths sessions and interviewed pupils. We hope that it was a positive experience for the pupils and teachers alike.

Other News

The school is working closely with the PTA to fundraise to improve the playground area over the next 2/3 years. Any donations or ideas on how to raise the money are always gratefully received by the school & the PTA.

The budget has been set for this year and although it's been tight we have been able remain in the black, due in no small part to additional pupil numbers. This will be debated at the next finance meeting. The Minister for Education is looking at the current unfair system school of funding which gives some areas much more money per pupil than others. As Nottinghamshire is in the lowest funding group this review can only be to our advantage. Fingers crossed!

Academy Status

Readers of previous newsletters will be aware that governors have periodically visited the topic of academy status and on each occasion felt that the school had little to gain by taking this important step. Although little has changed to make us wish to alter this decision, you will, I'm sure, be aware that the government has recently announced that all schools will become academies over the next 2/3 years.

Although we have yet to receive any information from the government, this announcement would appear to effectively change the 'should we or shouldn't we' decision to one of 'what type of academy do we wish to be'. Over the next few months governors will be investigating the various options open to us and taking

this important step only when we feel the time is right for the school and our children. We will, of course, make parents and carers aware of our decision before any action is taken.

Brightening up the school

We are acutely aware that our school is beginning to look a little 'tired' particularly around the entrance to the reception area. Funding for this type of project has been, and continues to be, very tight and so we would welcome any inexpensive suggestions that you may have as to what can be done. I can't promise that we will take up your suggestions but we will certainly view them seriously.


Link Roles: PE and Sport

School Governors are drawn from different parts of the community and can be parents, staff, co-opted from the community or nominated from the Local Authority. BHPS has 16 members on their Governing Body and they each take on different responsibilities for monitoring the school's progress and holding the schools' leadership to account.

Why Do We Have One?

The Governing Body has a wide range of duties and powers with a view to promoting the high standards of educational achievement. Its responsibilities include:

- Helping to establish the aims and policies of the school
- Working to raise standards
- Supporting the Head Teacher and staff
- Making sure the curriculum is balanced and broadly based
- Appointing staff
- Managing the budget
